Mr. Peanut featured in Florida Times-Union Newspaper

The Holly Hill History Museum was contacted recently for an article in the Jacksonville Florida Times Union Newspaper. The regular column answers questions by its readers. The museum provided photos and history. The following is a reprint of the article we thought you would enjoy. Share your memories of Mr. Peanut with us.

Dear Call Box: There was a tall Mr. Peanut statue on U.S. 1 that I used to see when I was heading south with my grandmother. It always stood out in my mind. Does anyone else remember it, and could you tell me where it was? J.A., Jacksonville

Dear J.A.: The Planters Mr. Peanut store with its towering 54-foot sign was a landmark on U.S. 1 in Holly Hill, a suburb of Daytona Beach. From 1958 to 1970 the snazzy monocled legume with his top hat and sleek black cane was a star attraction for tourists and residents.

"That Mr. Peanut sign was an iconic thing in Daytona Beach," said Kathy Kelly, former assistant managing editor of the Daytona Beach News Journal.

It has been one of the most popular topics on a Facebook site titled "I grew up in Daytona Beach!" Hundreds have commented on the huge logo at Ridgewood Avenue (U.S. 1) and Ninth Street. They also recall someone dressed as Mr. Peanut who walked in front of the store and waved at passing cars.

"As a child, he freaked me out, and I would hide in my parents' backseat when we would pass the store with him out front," one woman wrote.

"For a while he scared me, but when my parents took me right up to him, he shook my hand and bribed me with peanuts," said another. "I became his buddy."

A third person said she kept yelling, "the nut man, the nut man," until her parents made her stop.

They recalled the heady aroma that added to the store's appeal, and they recalled buying chocolate-covered peanuts, Spanish peanuts, peanut clusters, hot roasted peanuts and pistachios. The nuts were scooped out of stainless steel pans that were kept under hot lamps in a glass case. And they recalled such novelty items for tourists as straws and utensils.

For much of Mr. Peanut's reign, U.S. 1 was the main north-south corridor in Florida. In 1970, however, the shop was sold and converted into Wiggins Bros. Grocery by 1971. The roughly four-story sign was retained, but Mr. Peanut, with permission from Planters, was converted into a grocer with an apron, said Dean Wiggins, son of the late owner. As the business changed hands through the years, the sign was painted different characters, including a guy in a tux and an artist with an easel and brush. New Display Cabinet


Donated by City
